

1 of \$6,825.00 and psychological therapy at \$61,493.00. Thus, her
2 opinion for economic damages is in the range of \$966,821.00 to
3 \$1,008,991.00.

4 The defense psychologist, Dr. Dean Delis found that the
5 plaintiff suffered a slight permanent impairment as a result of
6 the incident and opined that the plaintiff would be able to
7 complete a four year college program without any special help.
8 He also believes that Vu could complete a graduate program with
9 special tutoring.

10 Dr. Fred McFarlane, the defense vocational rehabilitation
11 expert found Vu to be honest and determined. Dr. McFarlane
12 opined that Vu had the ability to complete a four year college
13 degree program and could succeed in the areas of psychology and
14 sociology, two fields where Vu expressed an interest. To
15 complete this course of study, it would probably take Vu 5 to 6
16 years to attain his B.A. degree.

17 Dr. McFarlane believed that it was uncertain if Vu could
18 have achieved his pre-accident goal of admission to the air
19 force academy with his pre-accident high school GPA and SAT
20 scores.

21 Vu Dang has been portrayed as an exceptional individual
22 pre-accident with limitless future potential. Plaintiffs have
23 insisted that pre-accident Vu had an IQ in excess of 130. They
24 base this conclusion on the fact that Vu participated in the
25 GATE program while in elementary and junior high school.
26 However, there is no objective evidence to support this
27 position. In fact, GATE program participation did not mandate a
28 130 IQ.
